1. Character Proportions

⌕ Question (fold →)	Answer
Why are the eyes on a manga character drawn slightly smaller when the head is turned to the side (profile view)?	Because in profile only one eye is visible and it appears flatter from the side — From the side, only one eye is visible, and that eye appears narrower because we see it edge-on rather than straight at the front.
When drawing a manga head from the front, where should the ears typically be placed?	Between the eye line and the bottom of the nose — Ears sit on the side of the head between the eye line and the bottom of the nose. This placement looks natural and balanced.
If you draw a character at exactly 5 heads tall, who are they most likely to be?	A child or young teen — A 5-head-tall character usually reads as a child or young teen — taller than chibi but shorter than a full adult.
Which proportion choice would best suit a tall, mature warrior character?	About 8 heads tall with a strong, angular jaw — Taller proportions (around 8 heads) and angular jaws communicate maturity, height, and strength — common choices for warrior or hero designs.
Why might an artist choose chibi proportions for a scene?	To make a moment feel funny, cute, or emotional in an exaggerated way — Chibi proportions exaggerate emotion. Artists often switch to chibi for funny or super-cute moments inside an otherwise normally-proportioned story.
What is the best first step when starting a new manga character drawing?	Lightly sketch the basic head shape and proportion guidelines — Begin with light construction sketches: head shape, centerlines, and proportion guides. Detail and inking come later, once the foundation is correct.
Two artists drew the same character. Artist A used 7 heads of height. Artist B used 3 heads. What is the main difference in the result?	Artist A's character looks mature and realistic; Artist B's looks chibi and cute — Head count is a major style choice. 7 heads reads mature and realistic; 3 heads is firmly chibi, signaling cuteness or comedy.
What is the purpose of a vertical centerline on a manga head?	To help place the nose and mouth evenly along the middle of the face — The vertical centerline runs from forehead to chin. The nose and mouth are placed along it so the face stays symmetrical.
What part of the head is the 'cranium' in manga construction?	The rounded top part that holds the brain, drawn as a circle — The cranium is the rounded upper skull. In manga it's drawn as the starting circle, and the jaw is attached below it.
What does the jawline do in manga head construction?	It defines the lower part of the face, from below the cheek to the chin — The jawline forms the lower face shape. A softer, rounder jaw suggests youth or femininity, while a sharper, more angular jaw suggests an older or tougher character.
Compared to an adult, how is a manga child character usually drawn?	Shorter, with a bigger head relative to the body — about 4 to 6 heads tall — Manga children are usually 4 to 6 heads tall. Their heads are larger in proportion to their bodies, which signals youth to the reader.
What basic shape do manga artists most often start with when drawing a	A circle or oval — Manga artists begin head construction with a circle or

character's head?	oval, then add a jawline below. The circle approximates the cranium.
Why do manga artists use light construction lines before drawing the final character?	To plan the proportions and shapes so the figure looks correct — Construction lines are a planning tool. They help the artist place features correctly and check proportions before adding final details. They are erased after the final lines are inked.
What is a 'chibi' style character?	A small, cute character drawn with a big head and tiny body, about 2-3 heads tall — Chibi characters are drawn very short — often 2 to 3 heads tall — with oversized heads and tiny bodies. They are used for cuteness and comedy.
If you draw the eyes very large and close together, what effect does that usually have?	It makes the character look younger or cuter — Large, expressive eyes signal youth, innocence, or cuteness. Older or more serious characters often have smaller, narrower eyes.
How many heads tall is a typical adult manga character drawn in a standard, realistic style?	About 7 to 8 heads tall — A standard adult manga character is drawn about 7 to 8 heads tall, similar to realistic human proportions. Stylized 'chibi' characters use 2-3 heads instead.
Where on the face are the eyes usually placed in a realistic manga style?	On or just below the horizontal centerline of the head — Eyes sit on or slightly below the horizontal centerline. Beginners often draw them too high, which makes the forehead look small.
When checking a head drawing for symmetry, which guideline is most useful?	The vertical centerline running top-to-bottom on the face — The vertical centerline is the key symmetry check — the nose, mouth, and the spacing of the eyes should mirror across it.
Why is practicing head construction important before drawing full characters?	Because the head sets proportions for the rest of the body — Body proportions are measured in heads, so the head establishes the scale for the entire figure. A correct head makes the rest of the body easier to draw at the right size.
After drawing the circle for the head, what line is drawn next to help place the eyes?	A horizontal centerline across the middle of the face — A horizontal centerline (often called the eye line) is drawn across the middle of the head shape. The eyes are placed on this line so they line up evenly.
What feature do most manga noses share that makes them quick to draw?	They are simplified, often shown as a small line, dot, or angle — Manga noses are highly simplified — often just a line or shadow. This keeps the eyes as the focal point for emotion.
Which of these is a sign that a character's head proportions might be off?	The eyes are placed near the very top of the head with a huge chin below — Eyes that are too high on the head, leaving a huge chin, are a common proportion error. Returning to the centerline guide fixes the placement.
When the head tilts to the side, what happens to the centerlines?	They curve and tilt with the head, like lines wrapping around a ball — When the head tilts, the centerlines curve along its surface, like lines wrapped around a sphere. Eyes and nose follow the curves.
What is the main reason manga eyes are often drawn larger than realistic eyes?	To make the character's emotions easier to read — Large eyes give manga characters expressive range. Readers can quickly see joy, sadness, surprise, or fear in stylized eyes.
How are the neck and head connected	The neck attaches just below the jaw and supports the head — The neck attaches just below the jawline and angles forward slightly. It's

in a manga construction drawing?

roughly as wide as the jaw on younger characters and thicker on muscular ones.

2. Facial Expressions

⌕ Question (fold →)	Answer
Which detail best shows that a character is shouting loudly?	A wide-open mouth shaped almost like a square or rectangle — Shouting is shown with a wide-open mouth, often drawn nearly square to emphasize volume. Often combined with focused, intense eyes.
What is a 'sweat drop' in manga, and what does it usually mean?	A large droplet on the head showing nervousness, awkwardness, or embarrassment — A large sweat drop is a manga symbol for nervousness, embarrassment, or feeling awkward — like an exaggerated cold sweat.
What does a blush mark across the cheeks usually mean in manga?	Embarrassment, romantic interest, or feeling warm — Blushing in manga signals embarrassment, romantic feelings, or being flustered. It's drawn as pink streaks or dots on the cheeks.
What is a 'shadowed face' (vertical lines down the eyes/cheeks) used for?	To show dread, gloom, or a very dark mood — Vertical shading lines across the face are a manga symbol for gloom, dread, or despair — making the character look 'darkened' by mood.
How can color choices (in colored manga) help an expression read more strongly?	By matching mood: pink for blush, blue shading for gloom, red flush for anger — Color reinforces mood: pink blush for embarrassment, blue tones for despair, red flush for anger. Color and expression combine to deepen feeling.
What change to the eyes usually signals surprise in manga?	The eyes open very wide and the pupils become small — Surprised eyes open wide with small pupils, exposing more of the eye white. This makes the moment feel shocking or sudden.
Which feature in a manga face usually shows the most emotion?	The eyes and eyebrows — Eyes and eyebrows do most of the emotional work in manga. They can widen, narrow, slant, or sparkle to show feelings instantly.
What shape do laughing or very happy manga eyes often take?	Upside-down U shapes or curved arcs like smiling lines — Joyful or laughing eyes are often drawn as upside-down U or arc shapes, mimicking how real eyes squint when smiling.
What is the difference between a gentle smile and a smirk in manga?	A gentle smile is symmetrical and soft; a smirk pulls up on only one side — A gentle smile is even on both sides and softens the face. A smirk lifts one corner of the mouth, suggesting confidence, mischief, or teasing.
Which eye change usually shows sadness in manga?	Drooping eyelids, watery shine, or a tear — Sad manga eyes droop, often with a teardrop or a wet shine. Eyebrows usually slant upward at the inner ends.
Why are exaggerated expressions important in manga compared to realistic drawing?	Manga relies on big, clear feelings to drive the story quickly — Manga is a fast-reading medium. Exaggerated expressions communicate feelings instantly, so readers feel the story without long descriptions.
How are the eyebrows usually drawn for an angry expression?	Slanted downward toward the nose — Angry eyebrows slant down and inward toward the nose, creating a V or frown shape. This is one of the most universal anger cues.

Which is the best advice for drawing a new emotion you've never tried?	Make the expression in a mirror, study what your face does, then exaggerate it — Looking in a mirror gives you real reference for how each emotion changes your face. Manga then exaggerates those changes for clear visual impact.
Which combination would best show a character who is frightened?	Wide eyes, raised eyebrows, slightly open mouth, beads of sweat — Fear is signaled by wide eyes, raised brows, an open or tense mouth, and often sweat. Combined, they tell the reader the character is scared.
Two characters have identical mouths, but one has slanted angry brows and the other has high raised brows. What's the difference in feeling?	Slanted brows look angry; high raised brows look surprised or worried — Eyebrows are powerful — they can flip the same mouth from angry to surprised. Slanted-down brows say anger; raised-up brows say surprise or worry.
Which expression would best fit a character right after eating something delicious?	Closed, curved eyes and a happy smiling mouth, maybe with a blush — Enjoying food usually shows as closed happy eyes, a soft smile, and sometimes a light blush — a warm, contented expression.
If a character has half-closed eyes and a flat mouth, what mood are they probably showing?	Boredom or being unimpressed — Half-lidded eyes with a flat or slightly downturned mouth signal boredom, deadpan reaction, or being unimpressed.
How would you draw a determined expression?	Slightly narrowed eyes, a firm closed mouth, and strong eyebrows — Determination is shown with focused, narrowed eyes, a tightly closed mouth, and strong eyebrow lines — communicating resolve.
Which choice would BEST exaggerate joy in chibi style?	Huge sparkling eyes, an open beaming mouth, and floating hearts or stars — Chibi joy goes big: huge eyes, a wide smile, and decorative symbols like hearts, stars, or sparkles floating around the head.
What expression best matches a character who has just been deeply embarrassed?	Pink blush across the cheeks, eyes glancing away, and a small flustered mouth — Embarrassment shows as a blush, averted eyes, and a small fidgety mouth — sometimes with a sweat drop for awkwardness.
If a character is sleeping in manga, what symbol is most commonly drawn near them?	A small bubble coming from the nose or a 'Z' near the head — Sleep is shown with a small nasal bubble or 'Zzz' symbols, plus closed curved eyes. It's a quick way to say 'asleep.'
What does a small cross or pulsing 'vein' mark on a manga forehead usually show?	Anger or frustration — A pulsing vein or '#' mark on the temple or forehead is a classic manga symbol for anger, especially building frustration.
Why might an artist add stars or sparkles in a character's eyes?	To show excitement, awe, or admiration — Sparkling, star-filled eyes are a manga symbol for excitement, awe, or strong admiration — often used when a character sees something amazing.
When the eyes are drawn as simple '>' '<' or 'X X' shapes, what is being communicated?	The character is squinting hard, laughing, in pain, or fainted — Simplified shapes like '>' '<' or 'X X' show squinting, laughing hard, pain, or being knocked out. They are quick, cartoony emotional shorthand.
Why might an artist use the same character with different expressions in a single panel sequence?	To show how the character's emotions change as the story unfolds — Showing the same character with shifting expressions across panels lets readers follow their emotional journey, which is central to manga storytelling.

3. Body Anatomy

⌕ Question (fold →)	Answer
What is a 'silhouette test' for a pose?	Filling the figure in solid black to check if the pose still reads clearly — Fill the figure with solid black. If you can still tell what the character is doing, the pose reads well. If it's a blob, the pose needs more clarity.
Which joint marker is most important to plan before drawing a bent limb?	The elbow or knee, where the limb actually bends — Joints (elbows, knees) control where the limb folds. Marking them first ensures the limb bends at the correct point.
What does a 'mannequin' or 'wooden figure' construction help an artist do?	Block out the body in simple 3D shapes before adding muscle and clothing — Mannequin construction simplifies the body into 3D shapes (boxes, cylinders, spheres). Once the shapes are right, anatomy and clothing can be added on top.
Where does the wrist line up when the arm hangs straight down at the side?	Near the hip line — When arms relax at the side, the wrists hit near the hip level. This is a useful proportion check.
Why are heroic 'power poses' often drawn from a low camera angle?	A low angle makes characters look taller, stronger, and more dominant — Low camera angles look up at the figure, making them appear taller and more powerful. This is common for heroic, intimidating, or triumphant poses.
What is 'weight distribution' in a standing pose?	How a character's body balances over their feet, often shifted to one side — Weight distribution is how a figure balances. Most natural standing poses shift weight onto one leg, with the hip on that side pushed up.
What is a 'gesture drawing' in figure construction?	A quick, loose sketch capturing the pose's main flow and energy — Gesture drawings are fast, loose sketches that capture the overall flow and energy of a pose. They come before any detailed anatomy.
Why does mirroring (drawing one side and copying it perfectly) often look unnatural in a dynamic pose?	Real bodies in motion are asymmetrical — Motion breaks symmetry. One leg pushes off, the other receives weight; one arm winds up, the other balances. Perfect mirroring kills movement. — limbs do different things at the same time.
How can the hands help express a pose's energy?	Open, reaching, clenched, or relaxed hands send strong action and emotion cues — Hands amplify a pose. A clenched fist reads determined or angry; open reaching hands feel desperate or excited; relaxed hands read calm.
How long is the leg roughly, in head-lengths, on a standard manga adult (hip to heel)?	About 4 heads long — Adult legs run about 4 heads long from hip to heel — thigh ~2, lower leg ~2 — making up roughly half the figure's height.
What is the best practice routine for improving dynamic poses?	Doing many short gesture sketches from references and life to build a visual library — Frequent gesture sketches from photo references, life drawing, and observation build a strong visual library of poses, making future drawings faster and more confident.
Why is foreshortening important in dynamic poses?	It shows limbs that point toward or away from the viewer, creating depth — Foreshortening compresses limbs that project toward or away from the viewer. The near end appears larger and the far end smaller, creating 3D depth.
Roughly how long is the human	

arm from shoulder to fingertip in a standard manga adult, measured in head-lengths?	About 3 heads long — An adult arm is roughly 3 heads long from shoulder to fingertip. Upper arm ~1, forearm ~1, hand ~1.
What is the 'line of action' in a pose?	A single sweeping curve that shows the pose's main direction and movement — The line of action is a single flowing curve, often an S- or C- shape, that represents the pose's overall direction and energy. Limbs and torso build off this line.
If the character's weight rests on their right leg, what usually happens to the hips?	The right hip rises, and the shoulders tilt the opposite way for balance — Standing on one leg pushes that hip up. The shoulders usually tilt the other way to keep the body balanced — a classic contrapposto pose.
Which shape is often used to simplify the torso (chest and ribcage) in figure construction?	A box or a barrel shape — The torso is typically simplified as a box or barrel. This 3D form helps the artist rotate the chest correctly in different poses.
Why is studying real anatomy helpful even when drawing stylized manga?	Stylization works best when it's built on accurate underlying structure — Strong stylization grows out of real understanding. Knowing anatomy lets the artist exaggerate confidently and consistently — bending rules with purpose.
Which shape is most commonly used to construct the hip/pelvis area?	A smaller box or wedge shape below the torso — The pelvis is drawn as a smaller box or wedge under the ribcage. It rotates independently from the chest, which is how manga shows twisting poses.
Which combination would create the most dramatic 'jumping into action' pose?	One leg drawn up high, opposite arm extended forward, body curved along a strong line of action — Dramatic action combines asymmetric limbs, a curved line of action, and clear weight shift — making the figure feel like it's moving even on a still page.
Why do manga artists often exaggerate the line of action even further than what's anatomically realistic?	To boost the feeling of movement and energy, which matters more than perfect realism in manga — Manga pushes the line of action beyond strict realism to amplify motion. Readers feel the energy more than they notice the slight anatomical stretch.
When drawing a running pose, what helps it feel like real motion?	Arms swinging opposite the legs, with the body leaning forward — Natural running shows arms swinging counter to the legs (right arm forward when left leg is forward), with the torso angled forward into the motion.
Which is most important to plan FIRST in a dynamic pose?	The line of action — Plan the line of action first. It controls the pose's energy and direction; details like hair, eyes, and clothing come much later.
What does it mean when the chest box and the hip box face slightly different directions?	The character is twisting, which makes the pose more dynamic and natural — When the chest and hips face different directions, the body is twisting. This 'contrapposto'-like twist adds life and natural balance to a pose.
Which is a sign of a stiff, lifeless pose?	Both feet flat, arms straight at the sides, shoulders and hips perfectly level — Stiff poses are perfectly symmetrical and straight. Adding tilt, twist, or weight shift breathes life into a figure.
What is 'overlap' in figure drawing, and why is it useful?	When one body part visually crosses over another, showing depth in 3D space — Overlap is when one form crosses in front of another. It tells the viewer which part is closer, creating depth even in a flat drawing.

4. Panel Layout

⌕ Question (fold →)	Answer
What does a wide, short horizontal panel often suggest?	A wide landscape, slow movement, or a long sweep across a scene — Wide horizontal panels feel like a panoramic shot — great for establishing a setting, showing a wide environment, or stretching a moment in time.
What is the 'Z-pattern' (in left-to-right comics) or the 'reverse-Z' (in right-to-left manga) for reading flow?	The path the eye naturally follows from one corner to the diagonal opposite corner across rows of panels — The Z (or reverse-Z in manga) describes how readers' eyes scan rows of panels diagonally across the page. Layouts work best when panels align with this natural path.
What is a 'splash page' in manga?	A single very large panel that fills most or all of a page — A splash page is one giant panel filling the page (or most of it). Artists use splashes for major reveals, dramatic openings, or emotional climaxes.
What is a 'gutter' in comic and manga page layout?	The empty space between panels — The gutter is the blank space between panels. It separates moments in time and gives the eye a place to rest as it moves between beats.
If a page has 6 small panels and no big one, how might it feel?	Fast-paced, with many quick beats happening rapidly — Many small panels speed up the reading rhythm — each panel is a quick beat, creating a fast, busy pace.
What is the main purpose of a 'gutter' beyond just separating panels?	To represent the passage of time or a small jump between moments — Gutters represent time passing between panels. The wider the gutter, the bigger the time jump can feel. Readers mentally fill in what happened in between.
If a single panel takes up an entire two-page spread, what is that called?	A double-page spread — A double-page spread spans both visible pages, creating a huge canvas for major moments — often big battles, reveals, or landscape vistas.
What is a 'bleed' in manga page layout?	When art extends all the way to the edge of the page with no border — Bleed is when the panel art runs off the page edge, removing the frame. It opens up the scene and feels less contained — often used for big moments.
A character bursts out of a panel border. What does this technique suggest?	Strong action, energy, or that the character can't be contained by the panel — When a character or object crosses out of the panel border, it suggests power, energy, or that the moment is bursting beyond normal limits.
What is a 'close-up' panel used for?	To focus attention on a small detail or a character's expression — Close-up panels zoom in on a single detail — usually a face or an important object — to highlight emotion or importance.
Which panel order is correct for a 2-row manga page (Japanese style)?	Top-right, top-left, then bottom-right, bottom-left — Japanese reading order: start top-right, move left across the top row, then drop to the next row and continue right-to-left.
In traditional Japanese manga, in which direction does the reader move across a page?	From right to left, and from top to bottom — Japanese manga reads right-to-left, top-to-bottom. The top-right panel is first, the bottom-left panel is last on each page.
What does a tall, narrow	Height, falling, or a tall character/setting — A tall, narrow panel emphasizes verticality — a falling character, a towering building, or a long drop — by shaping the

vertical panel often suggest?	panel to match the image.
Why might an artist place a long horizontal panel across the top of a page?	To establish the setting clearly at the start of the page or scene — A wide horizontal panel at the top serves as a strong establishing shot, orienting the reader to the location before the scene continues.
Two characters argue in a scene. How can panel choices increase tension?	Use close-ups of their faces and tighter, more diagonal panels to heighten conflict — Tense scenes benefit from close-up reaction shots and slanted, tighter panels. The composition itself feels under pressure, matching the conflict.
What is a 'page turn' moment in manga?	A surprise or cliffhanger placed at the end of a right-hand page so the next page reveals something new — Page-turn moments hide reveals on the unseen side of the next spread, giving readers a surprise when they turn the page. A core pacing tool.
What is an 'establishing shot' in a comic page?	A wide panel that introduces where a scene is taking place — An establishing shot is a wide view that shows the reader where a scene takes place. It's usually placed at the start of a new scene.
Why is it important that panel order be CLEAR on a manga page?	If panels are unclear, readers may read them in the wrong order and lose the story — Clear panel order is essential. If the reading path is ambiguous, the reader may skip or misread panels, breaking the story's flow.
What is a 'beat' panel — sometimes a small or nearly empty panel between bigger ones?	A pause panel that gives the reader a quiet moment before the next beat — Beat panels are short, often nearly empty panels that create a deliberate pause — like a rest in music — letting a moment land before the next beat.
What does a larger panel usually signal to the reader compared to a smaller one?	A more important or dramatic moment the reader should spend more time on — Larger panels emphasize importance. They draw the eye and ask the reader to linger, often used for key story moments, reveals, or emotional beats.
Why do manga artists sometimes use slanted, diagonal panel borders?	To increase energy and tension, often during action or chaotic moments — Slanted, diagonal panels add energy and tension. They feel less stable than rectangular grids and are common in fights, chases, or emotional turmoil.
If a page has just 2 large panels, how is the pacing affected?	It feels slower and more dramatic, with each beat given more weight — Few large panels slow the pace down. Readers linger on each, making moments feel important, weighty, or contemplative.
How does a manga artist usually plan a page before drawing the final art?	By sketching a small thumbnail showing panel shapes, sizes, and rough composition — Pages start as thumbnails — small, fast layout sketches that test panel sizes, shapes, and reading flow before any detailed drawing.
Why do manga artists sometimes break panels into unusual shapes (triangles, jagged edges)?	To match the emotion of the scene — Unusual panel shapes mirror chaotic or shocking emotions. Triangular or jagged panels visually express fragmentation or intensity.
Why is variety in panel size and shape important across a manga chapter?	It controls pacing, emphasizes important moments, and keeps the visual rhythm interesting — Varying panel size and shape controls the story's rhythm. Mixing close-ups, wide shots, splashes, and beats keeps pacing dynamic and emphasizes key moments.

5. Screen Tones

⌕ Question (fold →)	Answer
What is a 'screen tone' in traditional manga production?	A pre-printed adhesive sheet of dot or line patterns used to add gray tones to black-and-white art — Screen tones are pre-printed adhesive sheets covered in patterns (dots, lines, gradients). Artists cut them and stick them onto black-and-white art to create gray values.
How is screen tone applied in traditional (physical) manga production?	The adhesive sheet is laid over the area, then cut along the edges and burnished down — Traditional tone application: lay the sheet over the artwork, cut the outline with a craft blade, peel away excess, and burnish the rest down.
Why is contrast important when using screen tones?	Strong contrast between toned and untoned areas keeps the image readable and dramatic — Tones work best alongside strong contrast. Pure whites, solid blacks, and a few gray tones together create depth without muddying the image.
What is a 'pattern tone' (as opposed to a halftone)?	A decorative repeating pattern like stars, flowers, sparkles, or stripes used as a background or decoration — Pattern tones contain decorative motifs (sparkles, flowers, stars, stripes) and are used as expressive backgrounds — often in emotional or mood-driven scenes.
Why might too many different tones on one page look messy?	Mixing many tones can make the page busy and confuse the eye about importance — Overusing varied tones clutters the page and weakens visual hierarchy. A few intentional tones direct the reader's eye better than a tone explosion.
