I'm a document that was written before any other records about the same event. Historians trust me the most. What type of source am I?

💡 A primary source! Examples include letters, diaries, and photographs from the time period.

I destroyed the city of Pompeii in 79 CE. I'm still active today near Naples, Italy. What am I?

💡 Mount Vesuvius! The eruption preserved the city under volcanic ash.

I connected the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans when I opened in 1914. Ships no longer had to sail around South America. What am I?

💡 The Panama Canal! It cut shipping distances by thousands of miles.

The ancient Egyptians worshipped cats and punished anyone who harmed them. Meanwhile, cats just sat there being cats. Some things never change.

Benjamin Franklin once wrote an essay about the science of passing gas. This is real. One of the Founding Fathers spent his valuable time on this. History is full of surprises, and not all of them are dignified.

Fun Facts

Did you know? The ancient city of Rome had over 1 million residents by 100 CE -- a population size that no European city would match again until London in the 1800s!

Did you know? Cleopatra lived closer in time to the Moon landing (1969) than to the building of the Great Pyramid of Giza (around 2560 BCE). The pyramid was already over 2,000 years old when she was born!

Did you know? The word "history" comes from the ancient Greek word "historia," which means "inquiry" or "knowledge gained by investigation." History is literally detective work about the past!

Did you know? The Rosetta Stone, discovered in 1799, was the key to deciphering Egyptian hieroglyphics. It contained the same royal decree written in three scripts -- and it took scholars over 20 years to crack the code!

Did you know? A century is 100 years, but the 1900s are actually the 20th century, not the 19th. That's because there was no "year zero" -- the calendar jumped straight from 1 BCE to 1 CE!

Did you know? The oldest known board game is Senet, played in ancient Egypt over 5,000 years ago. Game boards have been found in pharaohs' tombs -- even ancient rulers needed something fun to do!

Did you know? The Inca Empire in South America had no written language, but they kept records using knotted strings called quipus. Different knot types and colors recorded numbers, dates, and even stories!

Did you know? Oxford University in England is older than the Aztec Empire. Teaching at Oxford began around 1096 CE, while the Aztec civilization didn't begin until the 1300s!

Did you know? The Silk Road wasn't a single road and didn't only carry silk! It was a network of trade routes stretching over 4,000 miles, carrying spices, glass, paper, and even ideas like mathematics and religion.

Did you know? The word "Viking" actually means "pirate raid" in Old Norse. The people we call "Vikings" called themselves Norsemen -- "Viking" was what they did, not who they were!

Did you know? Ancient Greek athletes competed in the Olympics completely naked! The word "gymnasium" comes from the Greek "gymnos," meaning "naked." Gym class could have been a lot more awkward.

Did you know? The first known peace treaty in history was signed around 1259 BCE between the Egyptian pharaoh Ramesses II and the Hittite king Hattusili III. A copy of it hangs in the United Nations headquarters today!

Did you know? Humans have been around for about 300,000 years, but we only invented writing about 5,000 years ago. That means about 98% of human history has no written record at all -- we call that "prehistory"!

Did you know? The Great Fire of London in 1666 destroyed over 13,000 houses but officially only six people were recorded as dying. Historians believe the real number was much higher, because many poor people weren't counted in records.

Did you know? A millennium is 1,000 years. All of recorded human history -- from ancient Sumer to today -- fits in roughly five millennia. If you put that on a 24-hour clock, each hour would cover about 200 years!
