💡 The digestive system! It includes the stomach, intestines, and more.

I protect animals from infection by recognizing and attacking germs. White blood cells are my soldiers. What system am I?

💡 The immune system! I'm the body's built-in defense network.

I'm a test where the vet takes a small sample of an animal's blood and examines it under a microscope. I can reveal infection, anemia, or dehydration. What am I?

💡 A blood test (complete blood count)!

I'm the science of classifying living things into groups based on their shared characteristics. Kingdom, phylum, class, order, family, genus, species. What am I?

💡 Taxonomy! It helps us organize all living creatures.

I'm the body framework made of bones that supports and protects an animal's organs. Humans have 206 bones, but cats have around 230. What am I?

💡 The skeletal system!

I'm an animal whose body temperature changes with the environment. Lizards and frogs are examples. If it's cold outside, I'm cold too. What am I?

💡 An ectotherm (cold-blooded animal)! I rely on external heat sources to warm up.

A veterinarian's job is basically being a doctor for patients who can't tell you what's wrong. "Where does it hurt?" The cat stares at you. The dog wags its tail. The parrot says something completely unhelpful. You're on your own.

Fun Facts

Did you know? A dog's nose print is unique, just like a human fingerprint. No two dogs have the same nose pattern, and some kennel clubs actually use nose prints for identification!

Did you know? Cats spend about 70% of their lives sleeping -- that's roughly 13-16 hours a day. A 9-year-old cat has been awake for only about 3 years of its life!

Did you know? A horse's heart weighs about 10 pounds and can pump up to 75 gallons of blood per minute during intense exercise. That's the most powerful heart of any domesticated animal!

Did you know? The first known veterinary practice dates back to around 3000 BCE in ancient Egypt, where cattle herders treated their animals' injuries and illnesses. Veterinary medicine is over 5,000 years old!

Did you know? Dogs can smell about 10,000 to 100,000 times better than humans. Some dogs can detect diseases like cancer and diabetes just from a person's breath or body odor!

Did you know? A group of flamingos is called a "flamboyance." Other fun animal group names: a parliament of owls, a crash of rhinos, and a bloat of hippos!

Did you know? Rabbits' teeth never stop growing throughout their entire lives. They need to chew on hay and fibrous food constantly to wear their teeth down. Without it, their teeth can cause serious dental problems!

Did you know? An elephant's heart beats only about 30 times per minute, while a mouse's heart beats about 600 times per minute. In general, the larger the animal, the slower its heartbeat!

Did you know? Veterinarians need a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM) degree, which typically requires 4 years of undergraduate study plus 4 years of vet school. Specialists like veterinary surgeons train for an additional 3-5 years after that!

Did you know? Cats have about 230 bones in their body, which is 24 more than humans have. The extra bones are mostly in their spine and tail, which is why cats are so incredibly flexible!

Did you know? The word "veterinary" comes from the Latin word "veterinae," meaning "working animals." The profession originally focused on livestock and horses before expanding to companion animals!

Did you know? Sea otters hold hands while sleeping so they don't drift apart in the ocean. This behavior is called "rafting," and groups of rafting otters can include over 100 animals!

Did you know? A chameleon's tongue can be twice the length of its body and can accelerate from 0 to 60 mph in one-hundredth of a second. It's one of the fastest movements in the animal kingdom!

Did you know? Vaccines work by showing the immune system a harmless version of a pathogen so it can build defenses before the real thing attacks. Edward Jenner created the first vaccine in 1796 using cowpox to prevent smallpox!

Did you know? A dog's normal body temperature is 101-102.5 degrees Fahrenheit, which is higher than a human's normal temperature of 98.6 degrees. What feels like a fever for you is perfectly normal for your dog!
