I'm a character who appears in many cultures' origin stories – I'm clever, I break rules, and I sometimes accidentally create things. What am I?

Silly Stuff

A cosmic egg is sitting in the void, waiting to hatch. – "Is anyone going to sit on me, or do I have to do EVERYTHING myself?" *cracks open* "Fine! Here's a universe."

Different creation stories have a group meeting to compare notes. – The Big Bang: "I did it with physics." The Norse myths: "We used a giant's body parts." Everyone stares. Aboriginal Dreamtime: "We sang the world into existence." Everyone: "...that's actually beautiful."

The World Turtle holding up the Earth gets a backache. – "Can someone ELSE hold this for a while?" The World Elephant: "I'm already standing on YOU." Turtle: "This is a terrible org chart."

The Norse frost giant Ymir wakes up and realizes the gods are about to use his body to make the world. – "Wait, you're going to use my eyebrows for a FENCE? My SKULL for the sky?! At least tell me the world will be nice." Odin: "It'll be... complicated."

A trickster deity accidentally creates earthquakes while trying to steal fire. – "Oops. Well, that's a feature, not a bug!" The other gods: "You say that about EVERY natural disaster."

The first atom in the universe looks around at the vast emptiness after the Big Bang. – "So... this is it? Just me and a lot of hydrogen?" *13.8 billion years later* "Oh, they made CATS. Okay, worth the wait."

A museum exhibit puts all the world's creation stories on a timeline. – The timeline is 50 feet long. The Big Bang gets the first millimeter. Everything else is arguing over which wall to use.

A philosopher asks "Why is there something rather than nothing?" and the universe responds. – "I've been here for 13.8 billion years and NOBODY has asked me that. Honestly? I have no idea either."

An alien visits Earth and asks humans where they came from. – Every culture gives a different answer. The alien: "So you ALL think you're special? That's... actually universal. We do the same thing."

The universe writes its autobiography but can't agree on the first line. – Draft 1: "It all started with a bang." Draft 2: "In the beginning, there was nothing." Draft 47: "Honestly, even I'm not sure."

Fun Facts

Almost every culture in the world has its own story about how the world began. – From the Aboriginal Dreamtime to the Norse ice giants to the Hindu cosmic ocean – humans everywhere have wondered "How did this all start?"

The Big Bang happened about 13.8 billion years ago. – But it wasn't really a "bang" – it was more like an incredibly fast expansion of space itself. There was no sound because there was no air!

In some creation myths, the world is made from a giant's body. – The Norse myth says the sky is made from the giant Ymir's skull, the ocean from his blood, and the mountains from his bones!

The "cosmic egg" appears in creation stories from China, India, Finland, and West Africa. – Despite being thousands of miles apart, these cultures all independently imagined the universe hatching from an egg!

Aboriginal Australian Dreamtime stories are among the oldest continuous narratives on Earth. – Some Dreamtime stories may describe events from over 10,000 years ago, including rising sea levels at the end of the last Ice Age!

The "World Turtle" myth appears in both Hindu and Native American traditions. – The idea that the Earth rests on a giant turtle's back developed independently on different continents – "It's turtles all the way down!"

Nearly every ancient culture has a flood story. – The Epic of Gilgamesh (Mesopotamia), Noah's Ark (Hebrew Bible), Manu's boat (Hindu), and Deucalion's flood (Greek) all describe a world-destroying flood. Some scientists think these stories may reflect real ancient floods.

Scientists think life on Earth began about 3.8 billion years ago. – The oldest evidence of life is found in ancient rocks called stromatolites – fossilized mats of bacteria that were among Earth's first living things!

The cosmic microwave background radiation is like a "baby photo" of the universe. – Discovered accidentally in 1965 by two scientists who thought their antenna was broken, it's the faint afterglow of the Big Bang – and it's everywhere in space!

The Aztec creation myth involves five "suns" (world ages), each destroyed by a different catastrophe. – Jaguars, wind, fire-rain, and floods ended the first four worlds. We're living in the fifth sun, which the Aztecs believed would end by earthquakes!

The Hindu concept of cosmic time is incredibly vast. – One "day of Brahma" (kalpa) lasts 4.32 billion years – remarkably close to the actual age of Earth (4.54 billion years), even though this number was conceived thousands of years ago!

The Maori creation story from New Zealand describes the sky father and earth mother being pulled apart. – Rangi (sky) and Papa (earth) were locked in an embrace until their children pushed them apart, creating the space for the world – light flooded in for the first time!

"Panspermia" is the scientific hypothesis that life on Earth came from space. – Some scientists think the building blocks of life (or even microorganisms) could have arrived on meteorites – meaning life's origin story might be an interstellar journey!

Joseph Campbell identified a pattern he called the "cosmogonic cycle" across world myths. – He found that creation stories worldwide follow a similar structure: from void to creation to destruction to renewal – suggesting something universal about how humans understand beginnings.

The James Webb Space Telescope is helping us see closer to the beginning of the universe than ever before. – It can detect light from galaxies that formed just 300 million years after the Big Bang – we're literally looking back in time at the universe's origin!
